

Cancer Patients and Survivors Walk the Runway at Miami Swim Week

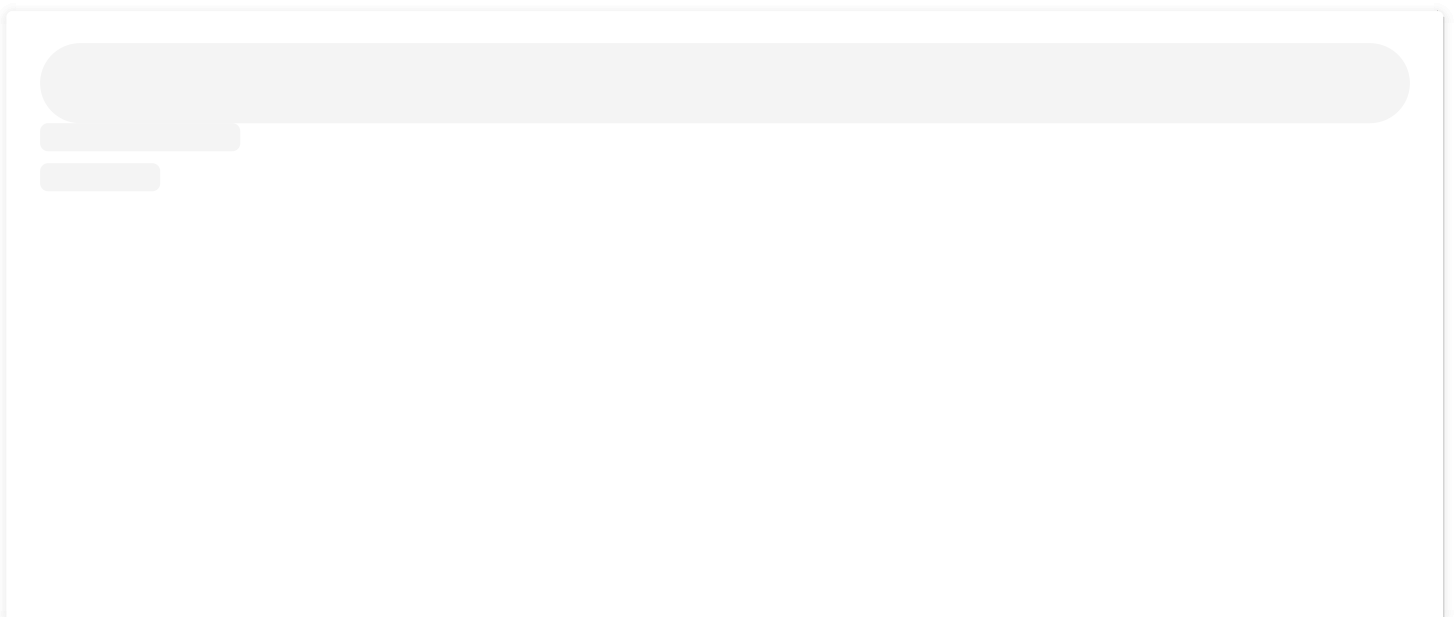
Influencer Sydney Towle joined the Chemo Club x Post Swim runway to celebrate the changes people undergo during cancer treatment and survivorship.

Influencer Sydney Towle, age 26, who is currently undergoing treatment for [cholangiocarcinoma](#), a rare bile duct cancer, walked the runway at [Miami](#) Swim Week on May 28 with three other models, all cancer patients or survivors, representing the post-surgery, scar-friendly swim brand [Post Swim](#) in collaboration with the [Chemo Club](#), a community-based cancer [support](#) platform for patients, survivors and caregivers.

“This Miami Swim Week, the Chemo Club and Post Swim are collaborating on an exclusive capsule collection, celebrating the women who have fought the unimaginable, yet who still show up boldly, beautifully and unapologetically,” wrote Chemo Club founder Alexandra O’Brien Roualdes [in an Instagram post](#) announcing the collaboration.

“We are doing this because women deserve visibility, survivorship deserves [community](#) and women in this space deserve to be seen in a space that typically ignores them,” continued Post Swim founder and [breast cancer](#) survivor Lauren Yerkes.

At age 23, Towle was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma. Diagnosed in only 8,000 Americans each year, the average age of people diagnosed with the rare [bile duct malignancy](#) is in the 70s, according to the [American Cancer Society](#). Towle walked in the fashion show just days after her oncologist suggested a transition toward [end-of-life](#) care, [according to her Instagram](#), a proposition that Towle refused.

Towle shared that she's currently in a clinical trial using [tumor-infiltrating lymphocyte](#) therapy. "We are not at the point where we're giving up," Towle said on Instagram, adding that she has since changed oncologists and her new doctor cleared her for travel so she could participate in the Miami show.

"I've struggled a lot with a post-surgical body, especially having this hepatic artery pump placed in my stomach that is very obvious when I'm in a bathing suit," Towle told [People](#). "Being able to walk for a swimwear brand that is empowering women to embrace those scars...is so empowering, and it makes me feel even more proud to be in the body that I am that has carried me through so much."

Tori Martinez and influencer Jen Taylor, who joined Towle for the Chemo Club x Post Swim show, are currently undergoing treatment for triple-positive breast cancer. When cancer cells have higher levels of receptors for a protein called [human epidermal growth factor 2 \(HER2\)](#) as well as the hormones [estrogen](#) and [progesterone](#), they are considered triple positive. This increases cancer cell growth, influencing treatment options. About 10% of breast cancer diagnoses are triple positive, according to [BreastCancer.org](#).

Danielle Gabrielle, the show's final model, will mark her five-year anniversary of estrogen-positive breast cancer survivorship in fall. Estrogen-positive breast cancer is the most common type, accounting for about 70% of all breast cancer cases in the United States, according to [Cleveland Clinic](#).

Post Swim and The Chemo Club [introduced their models on Instagram](#) following the runway show, with the following caption:

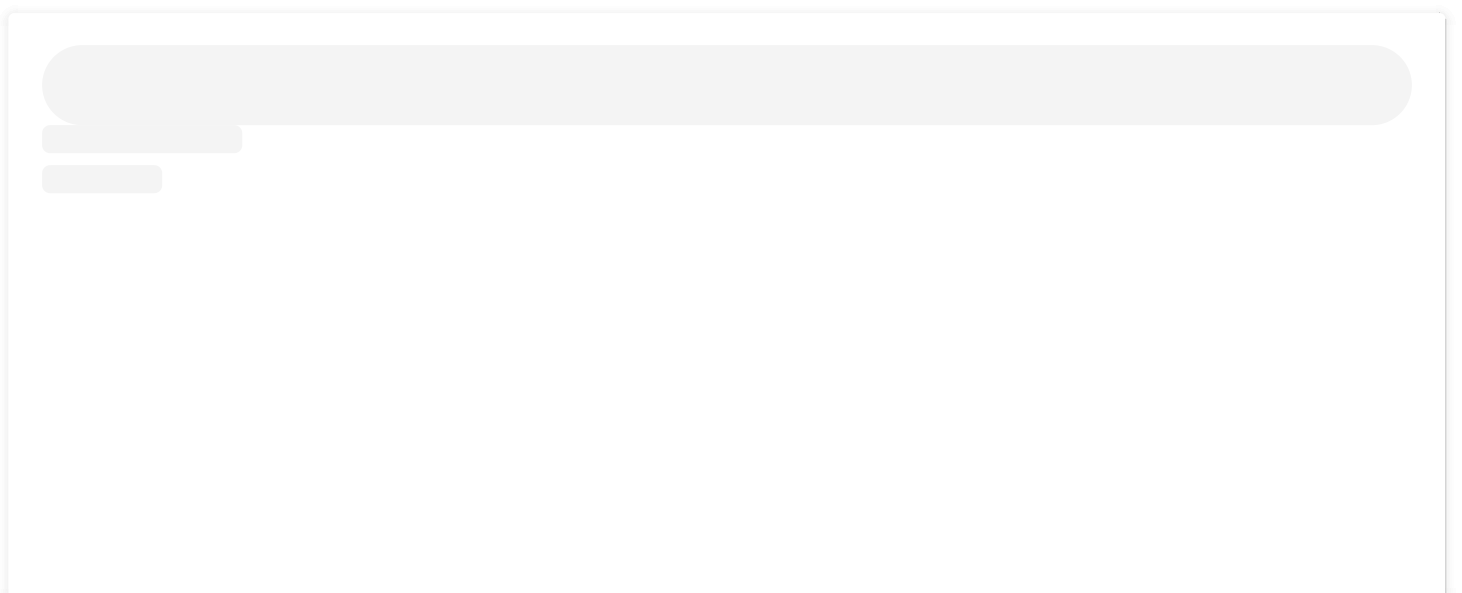
"Cancer had never been on a runway, we changed that.
