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MRA Announced a Record Breaking \$18.4M in 2026 Research Investments

MRA, the world's leading non-profit funder of melanoma research, announced its largest annual global investment of \$18.4 million to advance the next generation of breakthroughs in melanoma detection and treatment.

This year's portfolio supports 30 discovery-stage research grants, alongside advancing the RARE

Melanoma Research Consortium and the Melanoma Biorepository – critical infrastructure designed to unlock insights into the most complex and underserved forms of the disease. These investments span leading academic and medical institutions across the United States and 5 countries, reinforcing MRA’s role as a global convener accelerating progress across the field.

You may have heard of T cell receptor (TCR) therapies, when a patient’s own T cells are removed, engineered in a lab to better recognize cancer, and then infused back into the body. But there’s another approach called ImmTAC (immune-mobilizing TCR) therapies. These treatments don’t require removing cells. Instead, they work inside the body to help existing immune cells better “see” and attack melanoma more effectively.

What’s the difference between these approaches? Who might be eligible for each? What are the risks, benefits, and unknowns? Dr. Rino Seedor of Jefferson Health joined us on the Melanoma

The discussion explored how tumor-infiltrating lymphocyte (TIL) therapy is changing the treatment landscape for advanced melanoma and what patients and caregivers can expect when considering this highly personalized form of immunotherapy. The discussion explored melanoma prevention, early detection, hereditary risk factors, and how individuals and families can feel more informed and empowered when navigating dermatology visits and skin health. The session, titled "What Will Success Against Cancer Look Like in 2035?", explored how progress in cancer research is increasingly driven by the ability to identify risk earlier, intervene sooner, and continuously learn from patient outcomes. This session spotlighted the scientific advances that are redefining how cancer is managed and shortening the distance between discovery and impact on the patient.
